

Overview


<u>Hypothes.is</u> an open source web annotation tool that can be integrated into Canvas. The plug-in is available in the Region 11 Leveraging Canvas Conference course module but didn't seem to be configured properly. The screenshots below demonstrate how the plugin is supposed to function. Hypothes.is can be used for both public and private groups and annotations.

Instructions


1. Add a Hypothes.is item to your module using the External Tool option.




2. Allow Hypothes.is to access your Canvas account. If you do not yet have a Hypothes.is account, sign up for free access.




3. Insert the public URL you'd like to annotate or select a file available within your Canvas course (e.g., a PDF).




