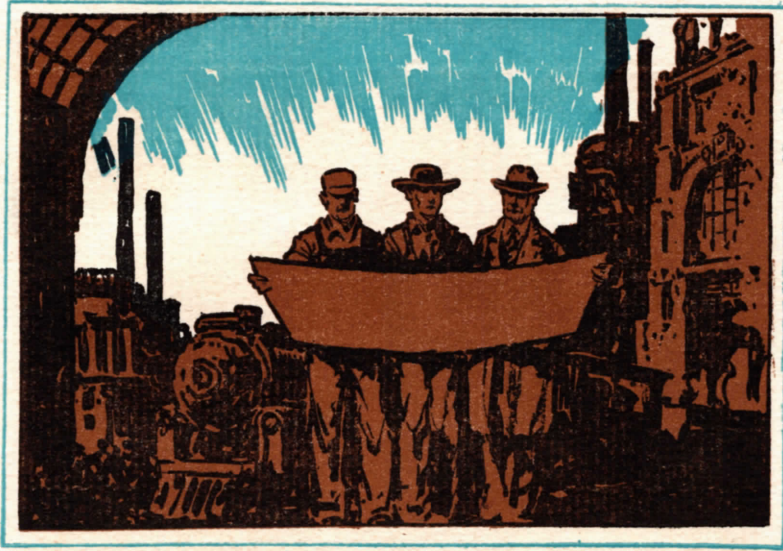

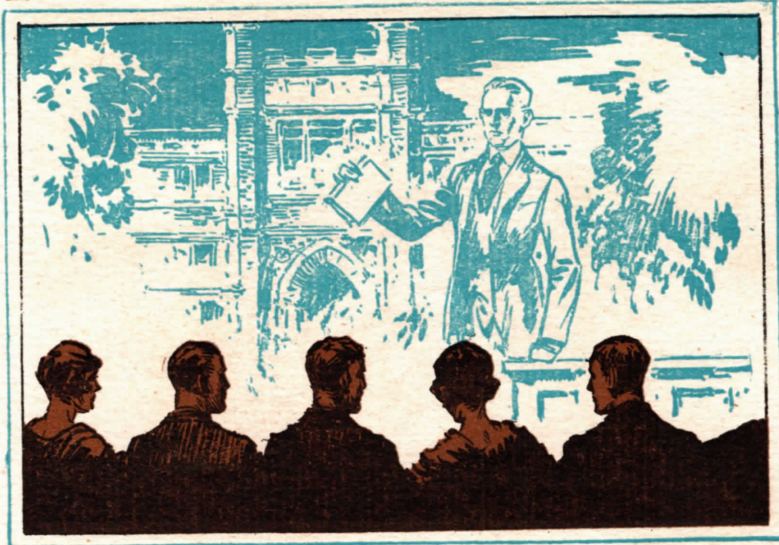


F O R E W O R D

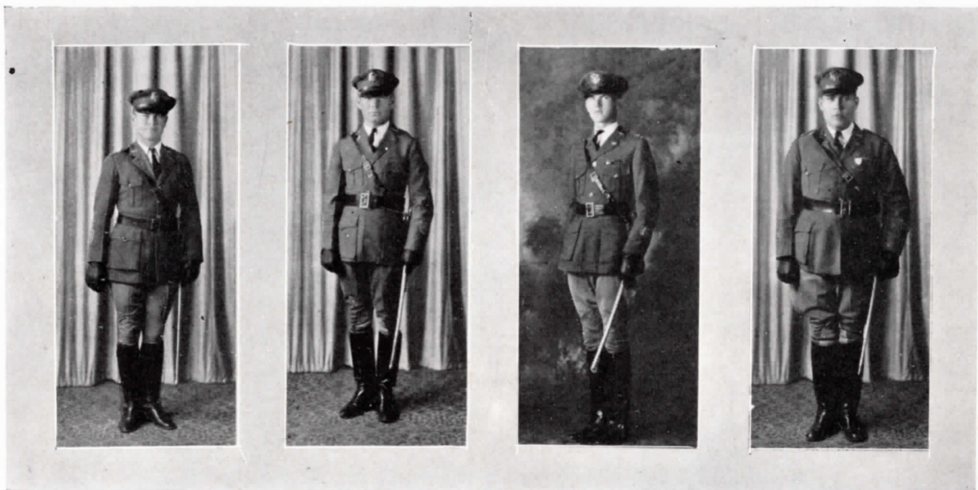


CAPTAIN COLEMAN

CAPTAIN EWELL

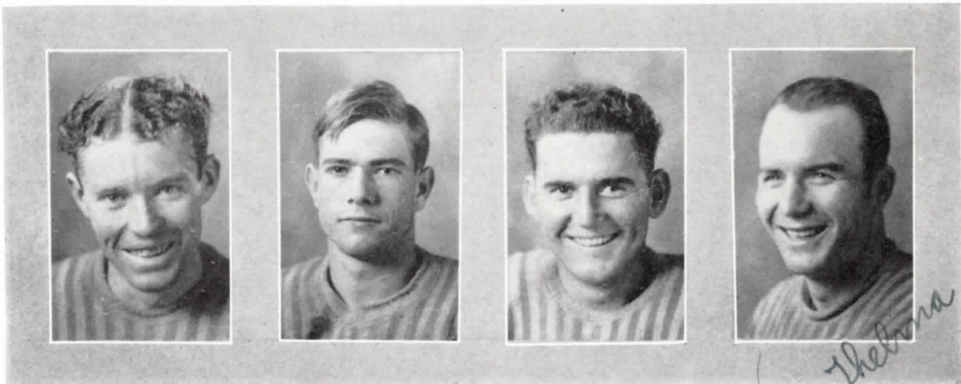
N. T. A. C. 23 — TEXAS MILITARY COLLEGE "BULLDOGS" 12

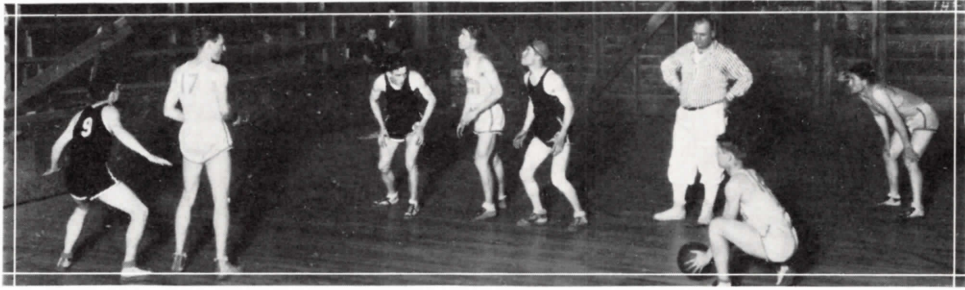
CAPTAIN-ELECT MAXEY

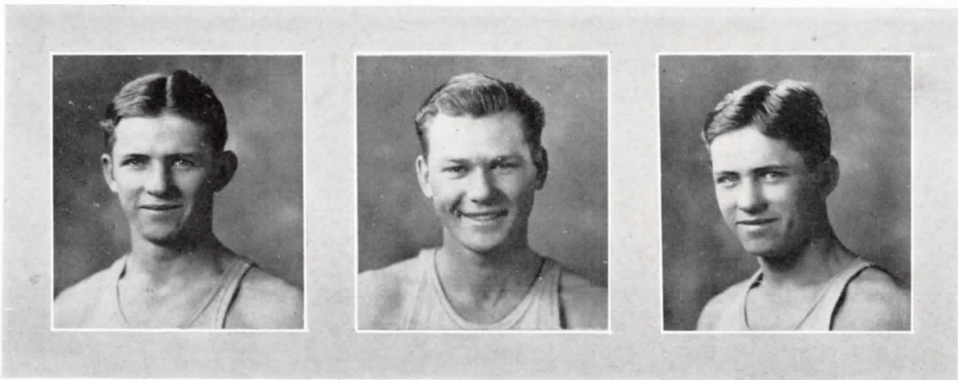

REVIEW OF THE SEASON

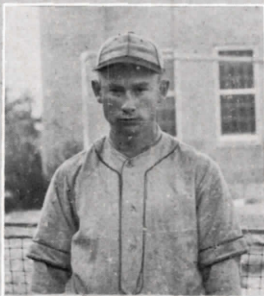
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The team as a whole was weak in no one position, though batting weakness was considered to be the greatest barrier. Interest and enthusiasm manifested by both Coach Hughes and the players could not have been improved. Wesley and Hillsboro, in all probability gave the home boys more anxiety than any other contenders, with the exception of Tarleton. In all of the cases where games were lost it seemed that N. T. A. C. lacked the self-confidence necessary to their success. In no instance was their defeat attributed to a lack of ability on the part of the players. In almost every combat the Hornets

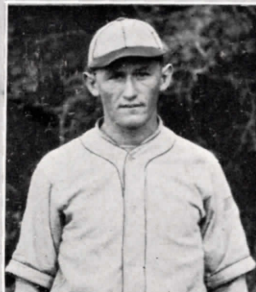

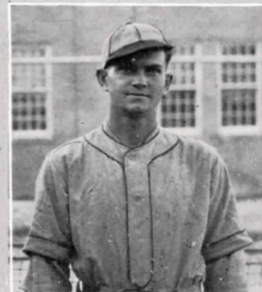

N. T. A. C. met the Wesleyans on the home field for their second two-game series and cinched the combat by winning both games through scores of 1 to 3 and 7 to 3. The playing of Lin Sansom could not be accurately judged by the box score, which credited him with three errors in the first game. He more than made up for these by two brilliant plays, one a pretty catch of a line drive over short, the other a difficult running catch of a hard hit grounder back of second. Grier Dickey starred with the iron man stuff for twelve innings. He allowed the opposing team only two hits and one run and struck out eleven men in the first game.

N. T. A. C. won and lost a game to Hillsboro in two fast encounters. The first game resulted in a score of 11 to 4 in favor of the Aggies, while the second game was taken by the Hillsboro proteges through a score of 11 to 8. Dickey won the first game, in which the fast Hillsboro nine featured with nine errors. Burress took Watt Harris' place in the pitcher's box in the third inning and satisfactorily demonstrated that he could toss the agate as well as he could chase it anywhere in the center part of the orchard. In both conference games the crowning scores which decided the conflicts was 11.

Two errors by Pope and one by Stacy opened the way for three Wichita runs.

The Junior Aggies scored in the first, fourth and fifth innings of the second game on Caine's round trip blow. McColloch scored by sliding to first. Pope scored from second on Stacy's single to right field. The lone Indian tally came as a result of a single and three errors. Grier Dickey pitched both games and allowed only two hits in the game he lost and four scattered singles in the second affray. In seven of the fourteen innings only twenty-two men faced him. 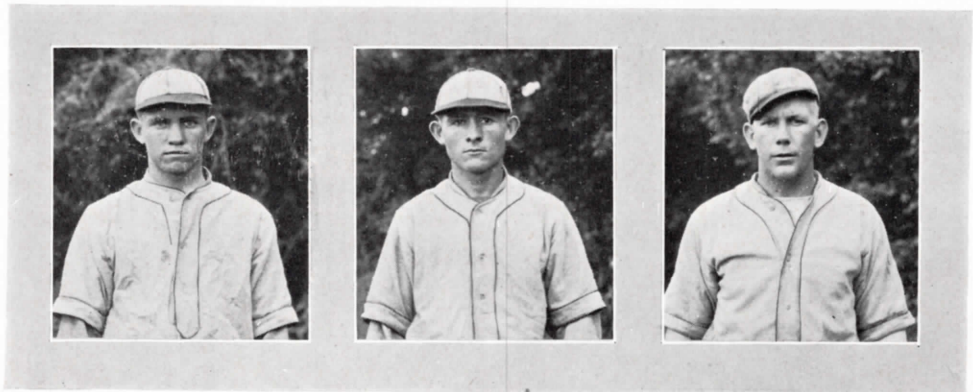

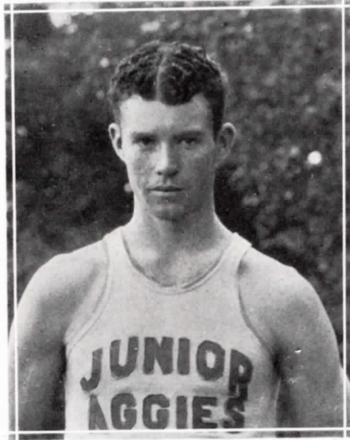
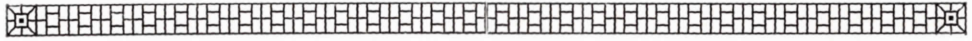

At Rice Institute the following day the relay team took second place in the mile relay and also second place in the medley relay.

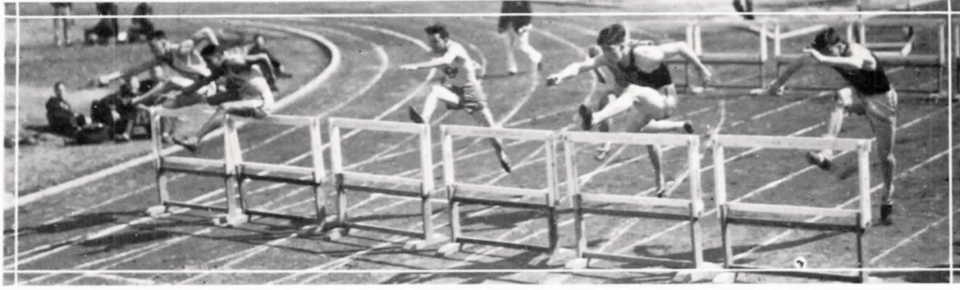
This trip won N. T. A. C. a trophy and the boys received wrist watches for first place and silver medals for second.

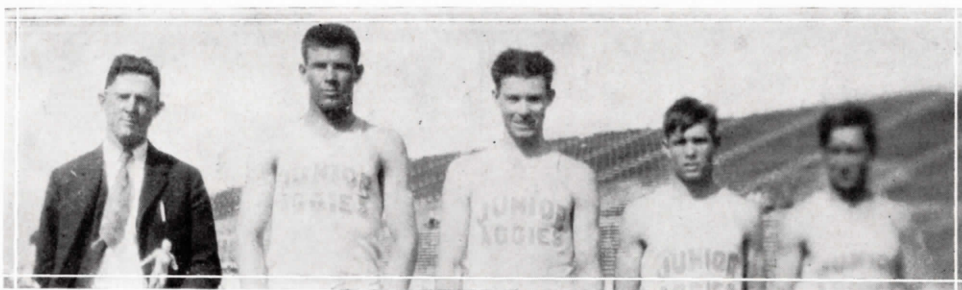

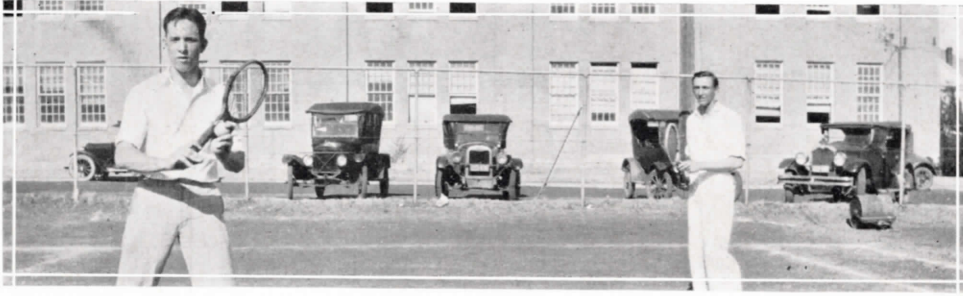
Having gained a fair knowledge of football during the season and learning the real meaning of that "ole fight," these men will be in line for the Varsity Squad of '28.

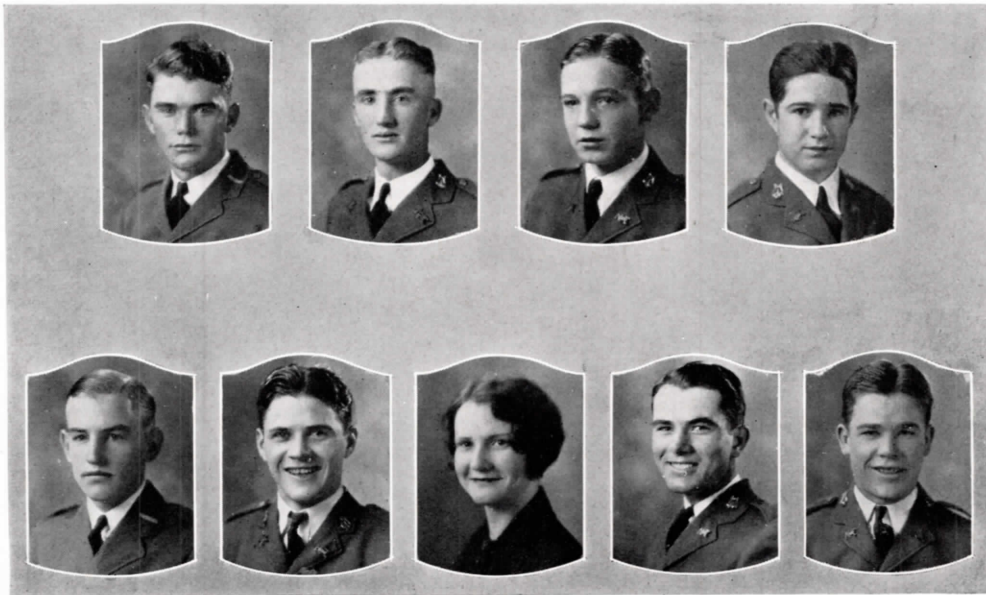
HASKELL COUNTY CLUB

An Appreciation



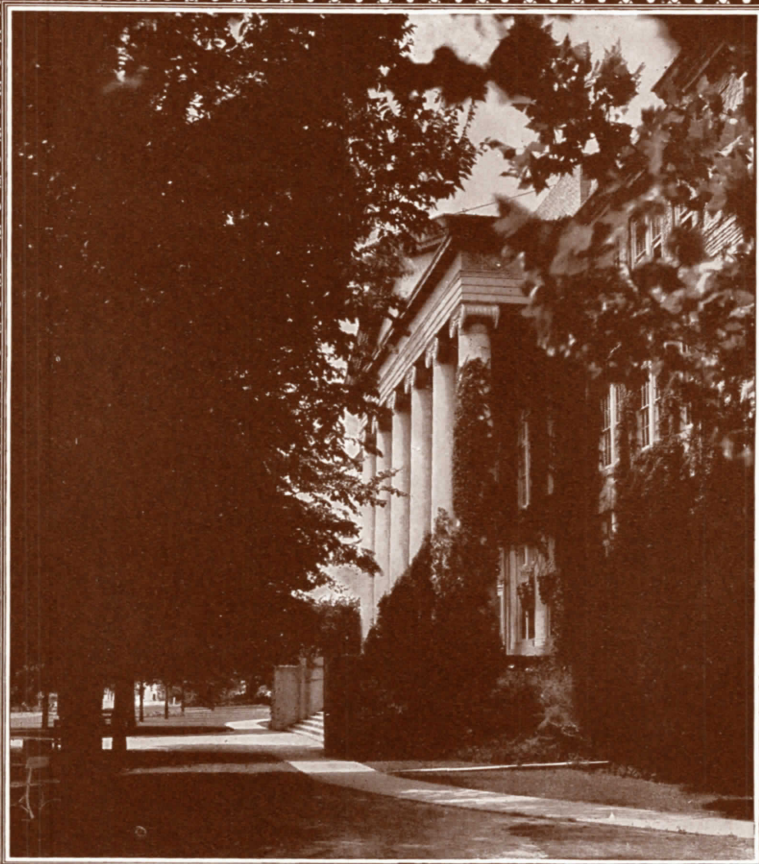
