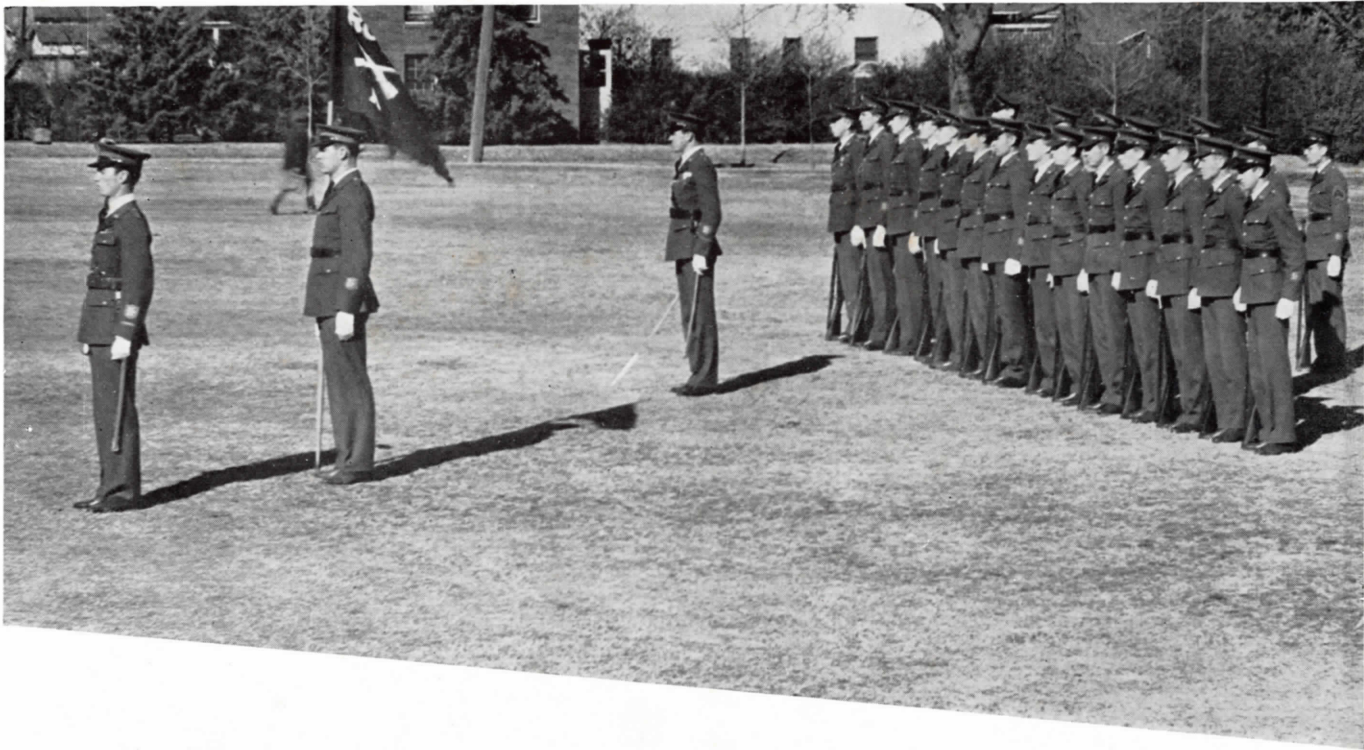
THE CADET CORPS

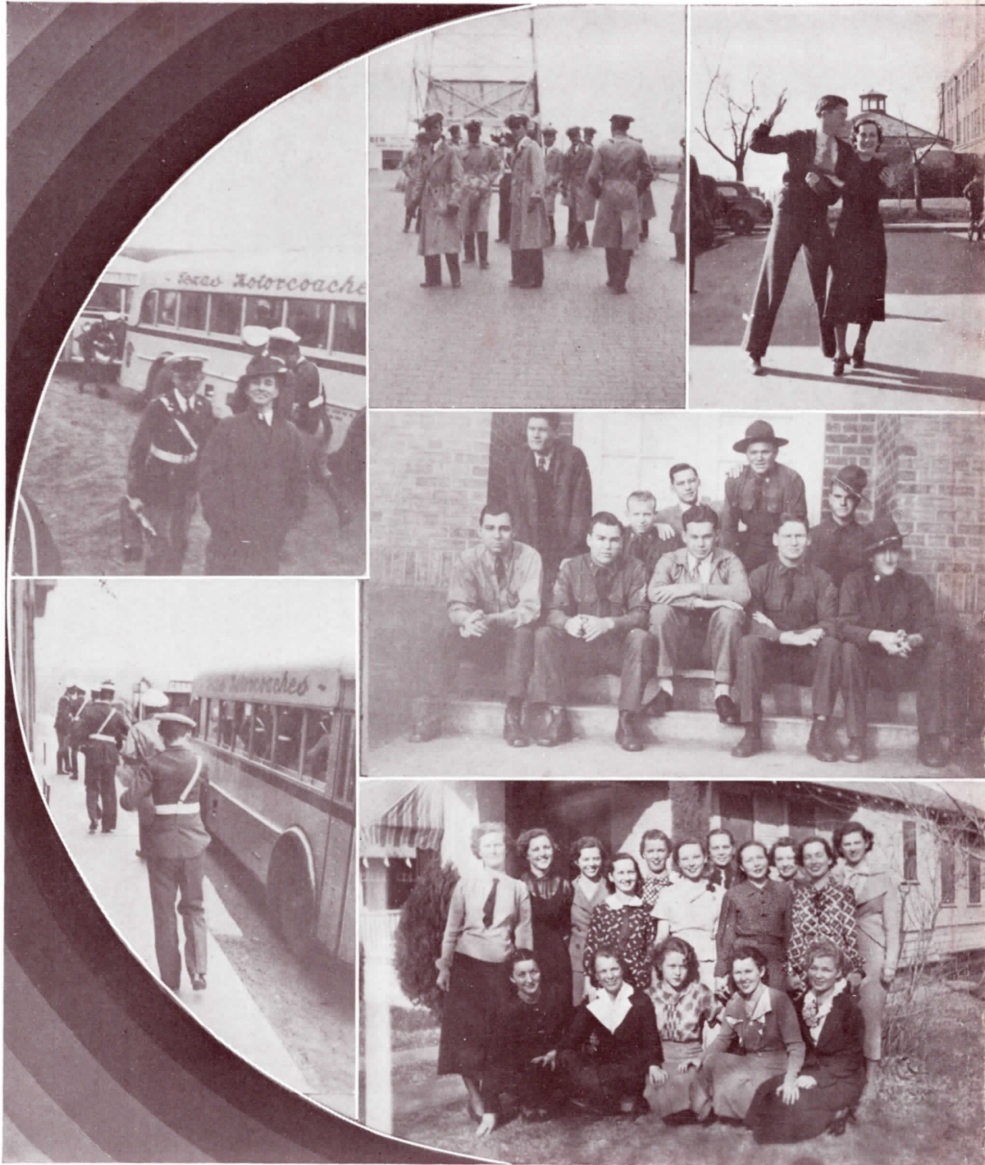

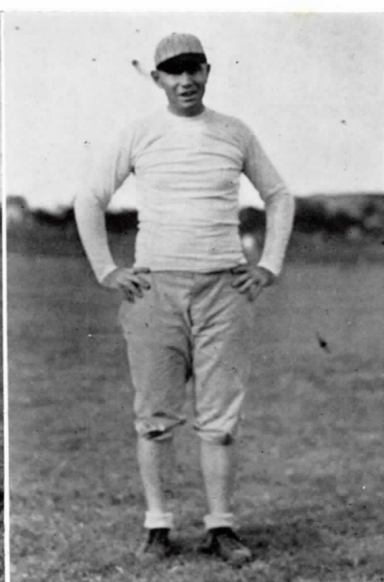
tacking. James Witt and Wally Bearden proved to be the high-lights of the backfield, while Raymond Pope and Frank Delk held staunch positions in the line.

brought the stands to their feet by a 70-yard run for a touchdown, in the second period.

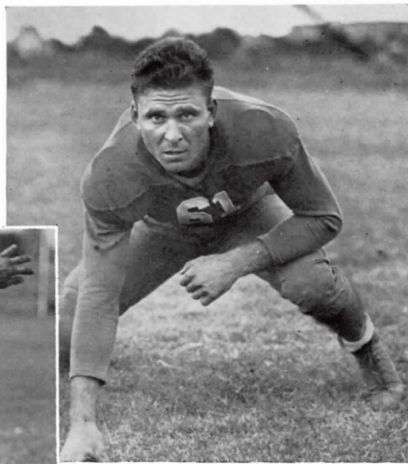

Playing on enemy territory, the Hornets downed the Texas Military College of Terrell 20-0, October 23. The

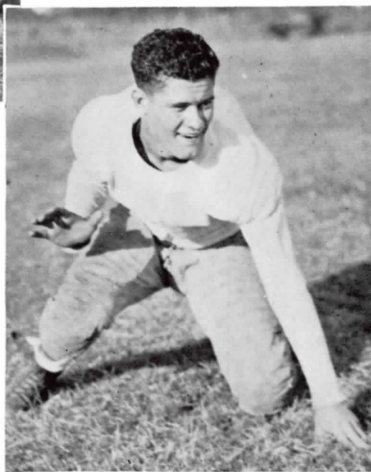

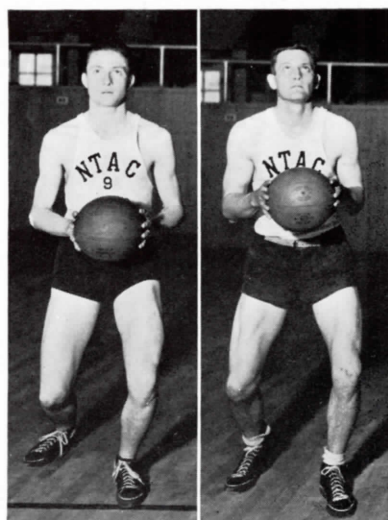
