The Libraries' Digital Media Lab (DML) is now open. The Digital Media Lab provides UTA faculty and staff with training, technical support, resources, and guidance in the use of digital media technologies for developing multimedia and web projects. The lab, a self-

service production facility, currently has two Windows 98 workstations available for use: (1) an Audio & Video Editing/Authoring Workstation and (2) an Authoring Workstation. The lab provides access to a large collection of software and a growing resource collection of books and magazines available for in-lab use. Census Data

Historical census information is available on the web from the Historical Census Browser put up by the University of VA.

UTA has many printed volumes of early censuses, and a set of reel to reel microfilms in cabinets on the second floor documents microform alcove for the 1790 to 1970 U.S. censuses. The data presented at the site <<http://fisher.lib.Virginia.EDU/census/>> describes the people and the economy of the US for each state and county from 1790 to 1970. This site is made available with the

cooperation and consent of the Inter-university Consortium for Political and Social Research (ICPSR) in Ann Arbor, Michigan. The data displayed there were initially created by ICPSR.

World Music Exhibit

Television News Archive <<http://tvnews.vanderbilt.edu/>> (Vanderbilt University) 1968-present. The Television News Archive collection at Vanderbilt University is the world's most extensive and complete archive of television news.

Readers' Guide Abstracts (FirstSearch supplemental). 1983-current. Readers' Guide Abstracts is a database that indexes and abstracts selected articles from the most popular general-interest magazines published in the United States and Canada.

PubSCIENCE <<http://pubsci.osti.gov/>> (Department of Energy) PubSCIENCE indexes peer reviewed journal literature in the physical sciences and other energy-related disciplines.

netLibrary.com (UTA IP only) Online access to full text scholarly, reference and professional eBooks (electronic books) from leading university, academic and professional publishers. The Free Reading Room area has a sizable collection of public domain eBooks.
