Gale Literary Databases to May 30.
Contemporary Literary Criticism Select contains criticism on the works of novelists, poets, playwrights, and short story writers now living or who died after Dec. 31, 1959.
This is the electronic version of a print series that comprises more than 200 bound volumes.

Health Reference Center Academic to May 30. Provides integrated access to indexes, abstracts, full text, and images of nursing, allied health, and medical journals, consumer health magazines; pamphlets, newspaper articles, topical overviews, and reference books. There are 265 searchable full text journals including the British Medical Journal and The Lancet. It also includes the USP Pharmacopoeia DI: Volume II Advice for the Lay Patient.

The Philosopher's Index provides indexing and abstracts from books and journals of philosophy and related fields. It covers the areas of ethics, aesthetics, social philosophy, political philosophy, epistemology, and metaphysic logic as well as material on the philosophy of law, religion, science, history, education, and language. To May 15.

Radical Scatters: Emily Dickinson's Fragments and Related Texts to June 30.

The core of this archive consists of eighty-two documents carrying over one hundred fragmentary texts composed by Emily Dickinson.

Texas Almanac to May 30.

An electronic version of the Texas Almanac 2000-2001. Information about the history, culture, politics, climate, and geography of Texas. Includes articles, tables, maps, photos. Browse by chapter or search by subject keyword or full text.

Texas Newspapers to May 30.

InfoTrac Custom Newspapers is a full text newspaper database that allows searching of articles by title, headline, date, author, section or other assigned fields. Currently the Dallas Morning News is available; as more Texas newspapers are loaded, they will be added to our trial.

Library Course Reserves Go Online

Beginning in May 2000, Reserves is expanded so that selected items can be available to students on the web. E-Reserves items can be:

- Articles from a print journal
- Chapters from a book or other print collection
- Syllabus, course notes, study guides, sample tests, or other materials you've written for your course
- Articles from electronic magazines or journals available at UTA (see http://www2.uta.edu/library/ejournals.html for UTA's electronic subscriptions)
- Links to external web pages

The Access Services Department will digitize print materials, process electronic files, and make those materials available through the library catalog PULSe Course Reserves search. Access to the E-Reserves materials for your course is restricted (by password) to you, the students enrolled in your course, and library support staff.

Students do not need a special computer connection or UTA IP address to use E-Reserves. However, they will need the password that you will give them once the library notifies you that the materials are ready. They will also need Adobe Acrobat Reader. Computer workstations on campus generally have this available. For other computers, Acrobat Reader software can be downloaded free from the Adobe web site at http://www.adobe.com/products/acrobat/readstep.html.

- Use our request form at http://www.uta.edu/library/access/rsrvreq.html.
- If the item is an article from a print book or journal in the Libraries' collection, let us photocopy the original for you, to ensure the best possible digitized document.
